# Remote Australia Strategies Implementation Plan

NATIONAL PARTNERSHIP ON NORTHERN TERRITORY REMOTE ABORIGINAL INVESTMENT

## PART 1: PRELIMINARIES

This Implementation Plan is a schedule to the National Partnership on Northern Territory Remote Aboriginal Investment (the National Partnership) and should be read in conjunction with that Agreement. The objective in the National Partnership is to support safe and healthy communities, increase access to interpreter services and job opportunities for adults.

## PART 2: TERMS OF THIS IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

- This Implementation Plan will commence as soon as it is agreed between the Commonwealth of Australia, represented by the Minister for Indigenous Affairs, and the Northern Territory, represented by the Minister for Housing and the Minister for Local Government and Community Services.
- 3. As a schedule to the National Partnership, the purpose of this Implementation Plan is to provide the public with an indication of how the project is intended to be delivered and demonstrate the Northern Territory's capacity to achieve the outcomes of the National Partnership with regard to improving:
  - a. the durability and amenity of public housing in remote communities to complement the capital works schedule being rolled out under the National Partnership on Remote Housing. This Implementation Plan should be read in conjunction with the National Partnerships relating to Remote Housing;
  - b. the health and safety of remote community residents through the risk management, remediation and removal of dangerous asbestos and Asbestos Containing Material (ACM) from community buildings; and
  - c. the quality of Aboriginal language interpreting services, through supporting an increasingly professional interpreter workforce and developing a more self-sustaining interpreting service delivery model.
- 4. This Implementation Plan includes three Schedules:
  - a. Housing -1 July 2015 to 30 June 2018;
  - b. Asbestos removal from community buildings 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2016; and
  - c. Aboriginal interpreter service -1 July 2015 to 30 June 2022.
- 5. This Implementation Plan will cease on completion or termination of the National Partnership, including final performance reporting and processing of final payments against performance benchmarks or milestones.

- This Implementation Plan and its Schedules may be varied by written agreement between the relevant Commonwealth and Northern Territory Minister responsible for it under the overarching National Partnership.
- 7. The Parties to this Implementation Plan do not intend any of the provisions to be legally enforceable. However, that does not lessen the Parties' commitment to the plan and its full implementation.

### PART 3: STRATEGY FOR IMPLEMENTATION

## **Relevant Northern Territory context**

- 8. In developing this Implementation Plan consideration has been given to relevant Northern Territory context.
- g. Investment in housing is required to improve the current standard of housing in remote Aboriginal communities to ensure Aboriginal people can live in safe, properly constructed and well maintained homes and to address the high levels of overcrowding and homelessness. These improvements are critical to addressing Aboriginal disadvantage.
- 10. Commonwealth investment in asbestos removal is required in remote communities to address the legacy of asbestos and ACMs used during construction of community buildings and improve the health and safety of remote community residents.
- Additional investment in Aboriginal interpreter services allows for greater access to services across the Northern Territory, where more than 100 Aboriginal languages and dialects are spoken.
- 12. The programmes under this Implementation Plan have further dependencies as detailed in Table 1.

### Schedule information

The Schedules to this Implementation Plan detail the estimated costs, programme logic, milestones, performance benchmarks and associated payments, risk management, reporting, and roles and responsibilities of each element.

#### **Estimated costs**

- The maximum financial contribution to be provided by the Commonwealth to the Northern Territory is \$171.115 million payable in accordance with the milestones and performance benchmarks set out in each of the Schedules. All payments are exclusive of GST.
- 15. The estimated overall budget (exclusive of GST) is set out in Table 2. The budget is indicative only and the Northern Territory retains the flexibility to move funds between components and/or years, as long as outcomes are not affected. The Commonwealth contribution can only be moved between years with the agreement of the Commonwealth.
- 16. In addition to payments for the milestones and performance benchmarks set out in the relevant schedules, a one-off payment of \$3.976 million was made to the Northern Territory in 2015-16, for work completed under the former Stronger Futures in the Northern Territory National Partnership.

# Roles and responsibilities

20. The agreed governing body within the National Partnership on Remote Housing – the Joint Steering Committee (JSC) – will oversee the implementation of this Schedule. This body is comprised of senior Commonwealth and Northern Territory officials.

## Capital works planning

- Long-term secure land tenure is required as a basis for remote housing investment and reforms.
- 22. A Capital Works Schedule for the delivery of housing works under Schedule 1 of this Plan will be agreed by the relevant Commonwealth Minister with any minor amendments to be agreed by the JSC. Variations that affect milestones and associated payments are subject to the written agreement of Commonwealth and Northern Territory ministers with responsibility for Indigenous housing in accordance with clauses 34, 37 and 38 of the National Partnership.
- 23. The Capital Works Schedule will be informed by the following factors:
  - a. the condition of existing dwellings;
  - b. existing commitments to communities;
  - c. Aboriginal employment opportunities;
  - d. participation of Indigenous Business Enterprises;
  - e. value for money outcomes; and
  - f. scheduling of capital works under the National Partnership on Remote Housing.
- The following houses are not eligible for inclusion in the capital works schedule or in meeting the capital works target:
  - a. houses previously upgraded under the National Partnership Agreement on Stronger Futures in the Northern Territory (SFNT) housing measure; and
  - b. new houses constructed under NPARIH and any houses (new or refurbished) that receive capital investment under the National Partnership on Remote Housing.
- 25. All housing upgrades completed from 1 July 2015 must improve the durability and amenity of houses to optimise the useful life of the house, while ensuring it conforms to the NT Residential Tenancies Act 1999 and addresses the Remote Housing Provisions, as set out below. The works to be undertaken will be based on the condition of the house.

- 26. This Schedule also seeks to provide economic development opportunities to Indigenous Businesses and Eligible Enterprises to develop capability and capacity in the industry. Through contract opportunities, these enterprises will be encouraged to develop systems and obtain accreditation within the industry to be able to compete within the requirements of the Building Code 2013.
- 27. In addition to clauses 16(c), 16(d), 17(e) and 17(f) in the National Partnership, all contractors delivering housing works will comply with the relevant Northern Territory residential tenancy legislation and/or other legislation, relevant construction standards, schemes and codes, the Fair Work (Building Industry) Act 2012 and the National Indigenous Housing Guide, as required.

## **Remote Housing Provisions**

- 28. The exact nature of the works to be undertaken will depend on the condition of each individual house.
- 29. Upgrades will include improvements to make the house safe and durable, through the repair of electrical and plumbing components and by providing: a place to bathe; facilities to wash clothes, remove and store waste, and store, prepare and cook food.
- 30, Upgrades can also include:
  - a. durable paintwork internal and external;
  - b. work to increase the life of the structure, for example roofing, window galleries, or vermin proofing;
  - €. durable floor coverings;
  - d. robust, cleanable (non-porous) wet areas;
  - e. pantry lockers and basic storage;
  - f. fencing (to be delivered by separate local arrangements); and
  - g. disability modifications as required.

## Risk management

31. A risk management plan is in place. Risks have been actively identified, entered into a risk log and categorised in terms of impact and likelihood.

32. To qualify for the associated payment, the Northern Territory must meet milestones in Table 5.

# Reporting

- 48. As outlined in Table 11, the Northern Territory will report every six months during the operation of the overarching National Partnership to monitor and assess performance in the delivery of services, reforms and projects under this Implementation Plan. The final report will be for the period 1 July 2021 to 31 March 2022 and is due by 1 May 2022.
- The following information will be included in the Northern Territory's six monthly reports, and will be used by the Commonwealth to monitor progress in meeting the milestones in Table 11:
  - a. the total hours of training undertaken by interpreters;
  - the number of interpreters with a Diploma of Interpreting and/or National Accreditation Authority for Translators and Interpreters (NAATI) accreditation employed by the Aboriginal interpreter services;
  - demographic information on the age and gender of the interpreter workforce;
  - d. the number of languages interpreting can be provided in, including the number of interpreters per language and number of qualified interpreters per language;
  - e. the total hours and number of interpreting jobs by region, sector, client type; and

f. the total hours of interpreting by language and information about known job pathways or career progression experience by interpreters.
