NATIONAL PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT ON NATURAL DISASTER RESILIENCE

PART 1: PRELIMINARIES

 This Implementation Plan is a schedule to the National Partnership Agreement on Natural Disaster Resilience (the National Partnership) and should be read in conjunction with that Agreement. The objective of the National Partnership is to enhance Australian communities' resilience to natural disasters.

PART 2: TERMS OF THIS IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

- 2. This Implementation Plan will commence as soon as it is agreed between the Commonwealth of Australia, represented by the Minister for Justice and the State of South Australia, represented by the Minister for Emergency Services.
- 3. As a schedule to the National Partnership, the purpose of this Implementation Plan is to outline how the 2013-15 South Australian Natural Disaster Resilience Program (NDRP) is intended to be delivered and demonstrate South Australia's capacity to achieve the outcomes of the National Partnership.
- 4. This Implementation Plan will cease on completion or termination of the National Partnership, including the acceptance of final performance reporting and processing of final payments against performance benchmarks or milestones.
- This Implementation Plan may be varied by written agreement between the Commonwealth and the State Ministers responsible for it under the overarching National Partnership.
- The Parties to this Implementation Plan do not intend any of the provisions to be legally enforceable. However, that does not lessen the Parties' commitment to the plan and its full implementation.

PART 3: STRATEGY FOR SOUTH AUSTRALIAN IMPLEMENTATION

Project information

- 7. The project elements planned are:
 - (a) National Strategy for Disaster Resilience (NSDR) Leadership and Grant Administration

The South Australian Fire and Emergency Services Commission (SAFECOM) will undertake a strategic leadership role to ensure that the key objectives and outcomes of the National Partnership are achieved by coordinating and driving whole of state resilience program measures.

(b) State Strategic Grant Scheme (SSGS)

The State Strategic Grant Scheme will assist the State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC) to address state significant priority objectives identified in the National Strategy for Disaster Resilience - South Australia Implementation Plan by supporting projects that are most efficiently conducted on a State basis to deliver benefits across a range of hazards.

- (c) Natural Disaster Resilience Grant Scheme (NDRGS)

 The NDRGS is a competitive grants program that funds projects designed to support strategic priorities of the National Strategy for Disaster Resilience and enhance South Australia's resilience to natural disasters and other hazards identified in emergency risk assessments.
- (d) Emergency Management Volunteer Grant Scheme (EMVGS)

 The EMVGS is a competitive grant program that funds projects designed to support priorities identified in the National Action Plan for the Attraction, Support and Retention of Emergency Management Volunteers.

Estimated costs

- 8. The maximum financial contribution to be provided by the Commonwealth for the Program to South Australia is \$4.2 million (\$2.1 million per year for two years) payable in accordance with the financial arrangements set out in Part 5 of the National Partnership. All payments are exclusive of GST.
- 9. The estimated overall budget (exclusive of GST) is set out in Table 1. The budget is indicative only and South Australia retains the flexibility to move funds between components and/or years, as long as outcomes are not affected. The Commonwealth contribution can only be moved between years with the agreement of the Commonwealth.

- 10. The NDRP will leverage off applicant co-contributions, where possible to ensure that the overall funding model stipulated in the National Partnership is achieved. Specifically, the cost share of all applications will be negotiated to ensure that Commonwealth contribution do not exceed 50 per cent for each individual project.
- 11. Where the assessment panel agrees to a reduced applicant cash contribution, the State contribution will be allocated to address the shortfall and ensure a 1:1 Commonwealth to State match is achieved for each individual project.
- 12. All applicants are expected to provide some in-kind contribution. For the purposes of meeting match funding requirements, applicant contributions may include in kind contribution of up to 20 per cent of the cash cost of the project.

Program logic

- 13. SAFECOM will utilise funds from the National Partnership to conduct a grant funding program in South Australia (the NDRP) on behalf of the Minister for Emergency Services.
- 14. Alignment with the policy direction of the NSDR is a key consideration in the design of the South Australian NDRP. In particular, the concept of shared responsibility of governments, business, community leaders, the not-for-profit sector and educational institutions to improve disaster resilience. Additionally, the South Australian NDRP will seek to ensure that supported projects provide sustainable resilience outcomes.
- 15. All applications will be assessed against eligibility and other criteria prescribed in the SAFECOM 2013-15 NDRP Grant Management Policy (Attachment 2) which also prescribes the relevant approval processes for each project element.
- 16. Any funds not allocated in the competitive assessment process and any underspent funds from acquitted projects will be made available for future applications on the same basis to ensure that NDRP funds continue to be allocated for the intended purpose.

Risk management

17. Program risks have been actively identified, entered into a risk register and categorised in terms of impact and likelihood. A risk management plan is in place to ensure appropriate actions are taken to mitigate identified risks.

Relevant South Australian Context

- 18. In developing this Implementation Plan consideration has been given to the relevant South Australian context as described below. Key factors that have influenced the proposed direction are set out in Table 2.
- 19. In South Australia, the SEMC has developed a Plan to assist and guide implementation priorities identified in the NSDR. This Plan, called the *National Strategy for Disaster Resilience South Australia Implementation Plan* (Attachment 1), aligns with the National NSDR Implementation Plan and is an assurance tool to ensure resilience practices are embedded in the South Australian environment.
- 20. The project elements detailed in this Implementation Plan will achieve the outcomes and objectives stated in the National Partnership by recognising and supporting a range of initiatives that:
 - (a) provide leadership and executive support for the South Australian NSDR Implementation Steering Committee to provide high level leadership and coordination with respect to progressing the implementation of the agreed national NSDR priorities in South Australia as prescribed in the South Australia NSDR Implementation Plan, develop the associated Communications Plan and other projects as required;
 - (b) ensure that NDRP grant funds are managed effectively and that all Commonwealth and State Government requirements are met through transparent processes evidenced through sound financial management and reporting;
 - (c) prioritise the implementation of a sustainable State Emergency Risk Management Framework including the completion of initial State and Zone risk assessment and treatment workshops and facilitating the publication of risk information to the community of South Australia;
 - (d) support the key objectives of the National Emergency Management Volunteer Action Plan 2012; and
 - (e) reduce community vulnerabilities and build appropriate local adaptive capacity and resilience by progressing the implementation of NSDR priority action areas, being:
 - (i) mitigation;
 - (ii) improving the resilience of vulnerable sections of society (including Indigenous Australians, culturally and linguistically diverse communities, children and youth, the elderly and people with disabilities); and
 - (iii) increasing engagement with the private and not-for-profit sectors.

Performance Indicators

- 22. Specific performance measures to be reported by South Australia in relation to the objectives, outcomes and outputs of all program components are set out below:
 - (a) activities/projects approved, commenced and completed for funding programs (grant schemes);
 - (b) implementation of activities that address risks identified in the State-wide risk assessment;
 - (c) implementation of activities that contribute to the achievement of the priority outcomes of the National Strategy for Disaster Resilience; and
 - (d) implementation of activities that contribute to the attraction, support and retention of emergency management volunteers.

Reporting

- 23. South Australia will report to the Commonwealth against the agreed performance benchmarks as prescribed in Clause 22.
- 24. Program activity reports will be provided by 30 April 2014, 30 September 2014 and 30 April 2015 as prescribed in Table 3 of the National Partnership Agreement (Reporting Requirements and Payment Milestones).
- 25. Circumstances may give rise to additional reporting being sought from South Australia. Such requests should be kept to the minimum necessary for the effective assessment of

the project or reform. Requests should not place an undue reporting burden on South Australia.

Review and Evaluation

In accordance with the National Partnership, a review of the Agreement will commence approximately six months prior to its expiry on 30 June 2015. South Australia will participate in the scheduled review.
