# Implementation Plan for Replacement Paediatrics Unit, Broome Hospital

NATIONAL PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT ON HEALTH INFRASTRUCTURE

### **PRELIMINARIES**

- 1. This Implementation Plan is created subject to the provisions of the National Partnership agreement on Health Infrastructure and should be read in conjunction with that Agreement. The objective in the National Partnership Agreement on Health Infrastructure is to improve the health and wellbeing of Australians through the provision of high quality physical and technological health infrastructure.
- 2. The funding for this project has been allocated from the Health and Hospitals Fund (HHF). The objectives of the HHF, whilst not replacing State and Territory effort, are to:
  - invest in major health infrastructure programs that will make significant progress towards achieving the Commonwealth's health reform targets; and
  - make strategic investments in the health system that will underpin major improvements in efficiency, access or outcomes of health care.
- 3. This project will construct a new Paediatric Unit to enable additional high acuity patients in the Kimberley region to be treated at the Broome Hospital, rather than be transferred to Perth, as outlined in the submission to the Health and Hospitals Fund dated 16 January 2009.

# TERMS OF THIS IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

- 4. This Implementation Plan will commence as soon as it is agreed between the Commonwealth of Australia, represented by the Minister for Health and Ageing, and the State of Western Australia, represented by the Minister for Health.
- 5. This Implementation Plan will cease on completion of the project as specified in this Implementation Plan, including the acceptance of final performance reporting and processing of final payments against performance milestones specified in this Implementation Plan.
- 6. This Implementation Plan may be varied by written agreement between the Ministers.
- 7. Either Party may terminate this agreement by providing 30 days' notice in writing. Where this Implementation Plan is terminated, the Commonwealth's liability to make payments to Western Australia is limited to payments associated with performance milestones achieved by Western Australia by the date of effect of termination of this Implementation Plan.
- 8. The parties to this Implementation Plan do not intend any of the provisions to be legally enforceable. However, that does not lessen the parties' commitment to this Implementation Plan.

### PROJECT OBJECTIVE

- 9. The objective in this Implementation Plan is to construct a 550 square metre paediatric unit at the redeveloped Broome Regional Resource Centre which will include 12 beds in two 4xbed rooms and four 1xbed rooms and associated medical and surgical care facilities.
- 10. The designated use of the facilities is the provision paediatric services (including medical and surgical care) for children in the Kimberley region.

# ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

# Role of the Commonwealth

- 11. The Commonwealth is responsible for reviewing:
  - (a) Western Australia's performance against the project milestones specified in this Implementation Plan.
  - (b) Providing financial assistance to Western Australia for its performance against project milestones specified in this plan.

# Role of Western Australia

- 12. Western Australia is responsible for all aspects of project implementation, including:
  - (a) fully funding the project, after accounting for financial contributions from the Commonwealth and any third party;
  - (b) completing the project in a timely and professional manner in accordance with this Implementation Plan;
  - (c) meeting all conditions including providing reports in accordance with this Implementation Plan;
  - (d) all aspects of the delivery, management and performance of the Replacement Paediatrics Unit, including the management of all risks.

# PERFORMANCE REPORTING AND FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

13. The maximum financial contribution to be provided by the Commonwealth for the project is \$7.9 million payable in accordance with performance milestones set out in Table 1. All payments are exclusive of GST.

Any Commonwealth financial contribution payable will be processed by the Commonwealth 14 Treasury and paid to Western Australia Treasury in accordance with the payment arrangements set out in Schedule D of the Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations.

# BUDGET

16. Having regard to the estimated costs of projects specified in the overall project budget, Western Australia will not be required to pay a refund to the Commonwealth if the actual cost of the project is less than the agreed estimated cost of the project. Similarly, Western Australia bears all risk should the costs of a project exceed the estimated costs. The Parties acknowledge that this arrangement provides the maximum incentive for Western Australia to deliver projects cost-effectively and efficiently.

# PERFORMANCE REPORTING

- 17. Western Australia will provide performance reports to the Commonwealth to demonstrate its achievement of performance milestones set out in Table 1.
- 18. Each performance report is to contain the following information:
  - a) a description of actual performance of Western Australia in the period to date against the performance milestones and project budget;
  - b) details of any matter(s) that have arisen which could impact on the achievement of the Project Objective, and how Western Australia proposes to resolve this/these matter(s);
  - c) promotional activities undertaken in relation to, and media coverage of, the project during the reporting period; and
  - d) a description of the work that will be undertaken to complete the remaining performance milestones and any expected promotional opportunities during the next reporting period.
- 19. The final project report is due within 60 Business Days of the completion of the project or termination of this Implementation Plan.
- 20. The final project report will be a stand-alone document that can be used for public information dissemination purposes regarding the project and must:
  - a) describe the conduct, benefits and outcomes of the project as a whole;
  - b) evaluate the project, including assessing the extent to which the objective in this Implementation Plan has been achieved and explaining why any aspects were not achieved; and
  - c) include a discussion of any other matters relating to the project, which the Commonwealth notifies Western Australia should be included in the final project report at least 30 days before it is due.
