Program Plan

The Program Plan will outline how Tasmania will implement energy performance upgrades to approximately 1,600 existing social housing properties. The Commonwealth will assess the effectiveness of Tasmanian program activities in delivering energy upgrades to social housing.

The Program Plan will be used as part of the assessment process when reviewing progress against the Performance Milestones under this Agreement. The Program Plan will be reviewed and updated where required by Tasmania, in consultation with the Commonwealth, on a yearly basis.

Evaluation

The Commonwealth will evaluate the Initiative. To this end, the Commonwealth will conduct a mid-point evaluation in 2025 and an end of term evaluation in 2027. Tasmania will cooperate reasonably with the Commonwealth, including providing data and/or Tasmanian program evaluation, in the conduct of the evaluations.

Appendix A: Key parameters

The policy objectives of the Household Energy Upgrades Fund (Social Housing), also referred to as the Social Housing Energy Performance Initiative (the Initiative) are:

- Work in partnership with states and territories to avoid duplication and to <u>provide clear</u>
 additional benefits for social housing tenants, including those in both public and community
 housing sectors, above and beyond existing or announced state and territory programs.
- Contribute to the reduction of energy bills for vulnerable social housing tenants who face barriers to upgrades, including financial, information and housing tenure related barriers.
- Contribute to increased thermal comfort for social housing tenants, with associated quality
 of life and health benefits.
- Promote broader positive contributions to reducing Australia's emissions and improving energy performance social licence.

Key Design Principles

The 10 design principles for the Initiative will guide the states and territories' program design.

- 1. **Energy bill reduction and affordability:** target investment to catalyse uptake of energy performance upgrades that reduce energy bills for consumers.
- Impact: support energy upgrades for social housing tenants who face barriers (e.g. financial, information and housing tenure related barriers) and increase thermal comfort for tenants, with associated quality of life and health benefits.
- 3. **Support energy system reliability:** the Initiative targets reduction in energy use, easing pressure and supporting reliability of the energy system.
- 4. **Contribute to Australia's emissions reduction targets:** support Australia meeting its emission reduction targets of 43 percent by 2030 and Net-Zero emissions by 2050. The Initiative will target investment to catalyse uptake of energy performance upgrades that reduce household emissions and safeguard against impacts of a changing climate.
- 5. A partnership approach: designed in partnership with states and territories and in consultation with delivery partners and key stakeholders. The Initiative will seek to align with existing Commonwealth and state and territory programs and processes, avoid duplication and require evidence of additionality to policies and program already underway.
- Leveraging Commonwealth investment: to maximise the Commonwealth investment, projects will be prioritised that demonstrate that investment through the Initiative will provide significant benefits above and beyond existing or announced state and territory programs.
- 7. Risk management by design: safety in implementation will be secured through design with delivery partners and careful planning and sequencing of measures; with an emphasis on incorporating safety, training or competency requirements, accreditation, audit and inspection (including compliance with work codes and certifications) arrangements into program design.
- Catalysing business capacity and skills: stimulate business and skills capacity to deliver retrofits for electrification and energy efficiency upgrades in households. Consideration should be given to employment and business opportunities to optimise the benefits for women, First Nations Australians, and other under-represented cohorts.
- 9. **Inclusive:** Consultation with cohorts that are prone to energy hardship and over-represented in social housing, such as First Nations Australians, women and people with a disability will be required to ensure diverse needs for energy performance are met.

10. **Social Licence**: Building confidence in communities that the energy transition can deliver direct benefits.

Design Parameters

The design parameters set the boundaries for state and territory co-investment proposals.

Upgrades to communal spaces are within scope if all tenants using the communal space are social housing tenants and jurisdictions can measure the benefit of the upgrade to the social housing tenants.

Flexibility is built into the design to account for differences in home types and regions. Jurisdictions will develop their own prioritisation processes for upgrades, tailored to different housing characteristics within each jurisdiction (e.g. age of housing stock, climate zone, equity of distribution).

The Initiative is not designed to support general maintenance activities, however co-investments may leverage existing maintenance schedules to roll out the energy upgrades. Consideration will be given to maintenance as a direct consequence of enabling the energy upgrade (e.g. roof upgrades to enable installation of solar), however the majority of the funding per dwelling must be used on the energy upgrade itself.

Variations to parameters

Variations to the parameters outlined above constitute a variation to this Agreement, and will be agreed by Commonwealth and State Ministers.
