Duration	This Schedule is expected to expire on 30 June 2029.																										
Purpose	<p>This Schedule will support the delivery of the Restoring the upper Murrumbidgee River Program (the Program).</p> <p>The program activities funded under this Schedule will improve river health, environmental outcomes and water quality of the upper Murrumbidgee River by investing in on-ground works and supporting new science and monitoring.</p> <p>Implementation of the Program will be consistent with the strategic objectives, guiding Principles and outcomes of the <i>Improving the Health of the Upper Murrumbidgee: Strategy (the Strategy)</i>.</p> <p>Funding will be provided to NSW and ACT to implement agreed projects in the upper Murrumbidgee River that address the decline in river health and water quality and improve habitat for endangered and native aquatic species. Funding will also support research and monitoring projects, and projects that improve knowledge, community education and engagement.</p> <p>The upper Murrumbidgee River is defined as the main Murrumbidgee River channel upstream of Lake Burrinjuck and downstream of Tantangara Dam.</p>

Governance Arrangements	<p>A governance structure will comprise of Commonwealth, NSW and ACT representatives and be responsible for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>a) developing joint Program Plans to guide consistent Program implementation across jurisdictions, including but not limited to science and monitoring, communication and engagement and First Nations participation and engagement;</li><li>b) providing ongoing strategic direction and guidance for implementation of approved Projects; and</li><li>c) considering Project Work Plans ahead of Commonwealth approval.</li></ul> <p>A Terms of Reference for the governance structure will be developed and agreed between the Parties.</p>																								
Work Plans	<p>Projects to be delivered under this Schedule will be detailed in Project Work Plans (PWP) which are to be agreed between the state/territory senior official and the responsible Commonwealth senior official.</p> <p>NSW and ACT senior officials will each provide the Commonwealth with PWPs in line with the minimum requirements set out in <b>Attachment 1</b> and performance milestones in <b>Appendix A3</b>.</p> <p>The Commonwealth will approve the PWP subject to the criteria at <b>Attachment 2</b> being met.</p> <p>Annual variations to PWPs may occur to accommodate changed circumstances, subject to agreement by the responsible Commonwealth senior official. Variations must align with the requirements set out in <b>Attachment 1</b> and meet the criteria at</p>																								

	<p><b>Attachment 2.</b></p> <p>Recognising the need to commence priority activities as soon as possible, individual project proposals that meet the information requirements of <b>Attachment 1</b> may be brought forward for Commonwealth early consideration ahead of finalising the PWPs. Early priority projects will be assessed based on the criteria at <b>Attachment 2.</b></p> <p>Variations to agreed PWPs will be considered under the Program governance arrangements, ahead of Commonwealth approval.</p>
Recognition of Funding	<p>In addition to the requirements set out in clause 21 of the <i>FFA-Environment</i>, all Parties agree to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. recognise the Commonwealth funding contribution to projects in all publications, promotional and advertising materials including project signage, and all public announcements and activities in relation to the project as appropriate, and must consult the Commonwealth prior to the release of all promotional-related material concerning all projects funded under this Schedule;</li> <li>b. provide reasonable opportunity for the Commonwealth to contribute to developing communications strategies and associated materials;</li> <li>c. provide the Commonwealth with equal access to products obtained under this Schedule for use in the development of promotional material, including but not limited to project data, footage and images; and</li> <li>d. where the Commonwealth is a majority funder of the project, promotional material and public recognition, including announcements and launch events, should provide major prominence to the Commonwealth and opportunities for Commonwealth involvement.</li> </ul>

## Minimum requirements of Project Work Plans

### Requirements of Project Work Plans

1. A Project Work Plan (PWP) will set out the jurisdiction specific projects to be delivered under this Schedule, for the term of the agreement. A PWP will demonstrate the outcomes to be delivered by the agreed projects in line with the objectives of the Program, the relevant Project Stream and the *Improving the Health of the Upper Murrumbidgee: Strategy (the Strategy)*.
2. NSW and ACT governments are each responsible for drafting a PWP and submitting to the Commonwealth for approval by the responsible senior official in line with performance milestones in the relevant Appendices to this Schedule.
3. At a minimum, PWPs should address the following content:
  - a. Scope, outcomes and quantifiable outputs for each project stream and demonstration of how these comply with the eligible activities set out in **Attachment 2**.
  - b. High level activity delivery schedule(s), including a list of key deliverables to be provided at milestone dates throughout the project (including any required regulatory approvals).
  - c. Monitoring, evaluation, reporting and improvement plan specific to the activities within the PWP.
  - d. Stakeholder communications and engagement plan specific to the activities within the PWP for all stakeholders including relevant First Nations and aligned with the relevant joint Program Plans.
  - e. Governance arrangements for project delivery.
  - f. Risk assessment on key program delivery risks including proposed controls or treatments to mitigate risk.
  - g. The estimated costs required to deliver program activities and the required outcomes. Costings need to be robust and defensible.
  - h. A description of how activities will be developed, including collaboration with other participating jurisdictions, and link to the Strategy, joint Program Plans and other relevant river health strategies and action plans.

## Assessment Criteria for approving Project Work Plans

1. The Commonwealth will assess the draft Project Work Plans (PWP) in accordance with the assessment criteria set out below.

### Assessment criteria

2. The PWP addresses the minimum requirements of PWPs as set out in **Attachment 1** and as reviewed by the relevant governance arrangements.
3. The effectiveness and efficiency of project activities to deliver the program objectives and outcomes.
4. The degree of confidence the proposed projects can be delivered within the funding timeframes.
5. Plans demonstrate collaboration between NSW and ACT and integration of activities across jurisdictions to achieve Program objectives and outcomes.
6. PWPs provide opportunity for participation and engagement of community and First Nations throughout project lifecycle.

### Eligible Projects

7. Eligible projects are:
  - a. activities that occur in the Upper Murrumbidgee Program area, comprising the Murrumbidgee River, its tributaries and riparian lands upstream of Burrinjuck Dam and downstream of Tantangara Dam. The extent of riparian land shall be assessed on a case-by-case basis and agreed between the parties before proceeding.
  - b. activities that are expected to provide a measurable contribution towards the Program outcomes as set out in the Strategy.
  - c. activities that are not already funded or planned to be funded outside of this agreement by any party.
  - d. For Stream A – On-ground river health works, activities that improve the:
    - i. riverine health and instream water quality, including but not limited to erosion and fencing works, tracks and crossings, planting and revegetation activities, off-stream stock water supply, weed and willow control, grazing and pasture management in adjacent riparian lands, soil conservation works, sediment extraction investigations, feral animal control and relevant First Nations land management practices.
    - ii. health of native fish and crayfish populations and aquatic habitat including fish hotels, restocking, and other fish, aquatic biota and habitat projects, re-snagging. Prioritisation should be given to

- threatened native species (such as Silver Perch and Macquarie Perch).
- iii. overall ecological health of the Upper Murrumbidgee catchment area.
- iv. cultural values in the upper Murrumbidgee River and provide opportunity for First Nations community members to share and implement traditional ecological knowledge.
- e. For Stream B – Science, Monitoring and education activities:
  - i. including community engagement, cross border collaboration, upskilling, stewardship, communications and awareness.
  - ii. to monitor and support evaluation of the effectiveness of agreed project interventions.
  - iii. include status and intervention monitoring of water quality, waterway health, riparian and instream vegetation, native aquatic species that may include but not limited to platypus, rakali, invertebrates, frogs, turtles, waterbirds and fish (including genetic diversity and measures to improve this), sediment, streambed and streambank dynamics, environmental water evaluation, river heights and riparian and in-stream inundation dynamics, fish passage, climate change adaptation, and other science and monitoring projects subject to agreement by the Commonwealth.
  - iv. that recognise, share and build First Nations knowledge and science on river health and monitoring including Aboriginal Waterway Assessments.
  - v. that recognise, share and build community knowledge and science on river health and restoration.
- 8. In addition to the eligible activities above, project coordination activities and project administration may be funded, but must not be more than 10% of the total budget for the Program.
- 9. State/Territories may propose additional eligible activities relevant to the project type above subject to agreement by the Commonwealth. Proposals can be made via correspondence between senior officials and must include justification of which project type they fit under and how the activity will contribute to the program objectives and outcomes.
