# Additional terms

#### Milestones and Key Performance Indicators

Basin States will respond to requests for advice or guidance on the development of policy, regulatory or standards instruments to support the Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) in Table 2A.

#### **Reporting & Payment Process**

The reporting period is listed in the header of the table below (Table 2A). Each Basin State will report to the Commonwealth on or before the reporting date listed in the header of the table below against all milestones and key performance indicators (KPIs) as listed in Table 2A.

Using these reports and any supporting information (including that provided by the Murray–Darling Basin Authority (MDBA), the Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder, the Inspector-General of Water Compliance (IGWC)), the Bureau of Meteorology (the Bureau), and the Commonwealth Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (the Department)) will assess each Basin State's progress against its KPIs.

The Commonwealth will take into account where one Basin State has completed all actions required to fulfill an outcome (or output), but another Basin State or Commonwealth entity has not fulfilled their actions required to complete the outcome or output.

All milestones and KPIs are subject to acceptance and satisfaction by the Commonwealth that they have been 'met.' Basin States will receive payment upon fulfillment of the milestones and KPIs in Table 2A.

The Department will advise the Commonwealth Minister with portfolio responsibility for water (the Minister) of its assessment. The Minister's delegate exercising delegation authority under clause 41 of the Federation Funding Agreement – Environment will authorise payment to be made to each Basin State based on the funding arrangements in Table 1, and performance milestones and KPIs in relevant Basin State tables.

Basin States will be advised by the Department as to the outcomes of the assessment as soon as possible.

After payment is authorised, and Basin States have been notified, the Department will prepare an annual assessment report for publication on its website. The Basin States will be provided with an opportunity to comment before the report is published.

## Roles and responsibilities of Commonwealth agencies

As the administrator of the Schedule, the Department (including the Water Divisions, Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder, and other relevant areas) is responsible for monitoring, evaluation and final reporting on performance by the Basin States. The annual assessment report is made public for increased transparency and accountability.

Basin States will work closely with the Department, MDBA, the IGWC and the Bureau to deliver several Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). The Department, MDBA, IGWC and the Bureau will act as assessors of performance under the Schedule during reporting periods for the relevant KPIs.
