

# Northern Territory Remote Aboriginal Investment 2025-31 – Alcohol Harm Reduction

FEDERATION FUNDING AGREEMENT – AFFORDABLE HOUSING,  
COMMUNITY SERVICES AND OTHER

Duration	This Schedule is expected to expire on 30 June 2031.
Purpose	<p>This Schedule supports the delivery of the alcohol treatment and harm reduction investment priority under the <i>Northern Territory Remote Aboriginal Investment: Investing in Aboriginal Self-determination to Close the Gap in the Northern Territory Partnership Agreement</i> (NTRAI Partnership Agreement).</p> <p>The NTRAI Partnership Agreement is between the Commonwealth, the Northern Territory and the Aboriginal Peak Organisations Northern Territory (APO NT).</p> <p>This Schedule recognises that continued investment in alcohol treatment and harm reduction services is essential to supporting the achievement of multiple outcomes under the <i>National Agreement on Closing the Gap</i> (National Agreement), including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Outcome 1 – Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people enjoy long and healthy lives.</li> <li>• Outcome 13 – Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families and households are safe.</li> <li>• Outcome 14 – Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people enjoy high levels of social and emotional wellbeing.</li> </ul> <p>This Schedule aims to deliver on key objectives set out in the NTRAI Partnership Agreement, which are aligned to the Priority Reforms set out in the National Agreement, including:</p> <p><u>Priority Reform Two</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Resulting in tangible action and local jobs in remote communities in line with the Aboriginal employment target in the Additional Terms of this Schedule.</li> <li>• Building the capacity and capability of Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (ACCO) in remote communities to deliver high quality services.</li> </ul>

Priority Reform Three

- Improving the standard of remote services, including the design, management and delivery of high-quality, culturally responsive services.
- Ensuring Aboriginal people living in remote communities have equitable access to mainstream services in a way that is relevant to their context.
- Identifying and eliminating racism in mainstream organisations and institutions delivering services to remote communities.
- Embedding and practicing meaningful cultural safety in government organisations delivering services to remote Northern Territory communities.
- Delivering mainstream services for remote communities in partnership with remote communities and their organisations.

Priority Reform Four

- Providing Aboriginal communities, primarily through their representative organisations and the ACCO sector, with access to the data and information they need to make decisions, subject to meeting privacy requirements, and ensuring data security and integrity.
- Supporting Aboriginal communities, primarily through their representative organisations and the ACCO sector, to build capability and expertise in collecting, using and interpreting data to support self-determination.

Funding provided under this Schedule builds on previous Commonwealth investment in remote Aboriginal communities through the NTRAI and is intended to supplement service delivery in the Northern Territory. It is not intended to exclude or disadvantage the Northern Territory Government from accessing other funding sources, including from the Commonwealth.

Acknowledging the supplementary nature of NTRAI investment, where the Northern Territory Government negotiates with the Commonwealth for new funding for services and programs within the scope of NTRAI, the Northern Territory will notify the Commonwealth of the funding being provided under NTRAI for those services and programs with appropriate records maintained.

**Alcohol Harm Reduction**

This Schedule provides supplementary funding to support the continued delivery of alcohol treatment and harm reduction services, to reduce



alcohol-related harm in the Northern Territory.

Where possible, services will be delivered by ACCOs or through formal partnership arrangements between the Northern Territory Government and Aboriginal communities. Where services transition to community control, this will be done in line with clause 12 of the Partnership Agreement.

The Schedule supports the following activities:

#### Reach and Connect

The Reach and Connect service supports Aboriginal people living in regional centres and surrounding communities through case management, return to country and collaboration with other service providers to address the social determinants of health. The service delivers an integrated response to reducing harmful alcohol use, including counselling, housing applications, justice support services, mental health and social and emotional wellbeing (SEWB) services.

#### Continuing Care Coordination

The Continuing Care Coordination service offers a case management model of care to clients exiting a rehabilitation program. The service includes assistance and advocacy for therapeutic support, training, employment, housing, legal matters, and ensures supports are in place for clients returning to community.

#### Community-Led Solutions

The community-led planning process empowers Aboriginal communities to make informed decisions about their own approach to alcohol harm reduction. The process enables Aboriginal communities to implement targeted strategies to reduce alcohol-related harm in their communities with the support of community-led solutions grants, administered by the Northern Territory Government.

Community-led Solutions includes the provision of community-determined data. This enables Aboriginal communities to have access to information to fully participate in decisions that affect them. Empowering communities with community-level data strengthens self-determination, builds local capacity and ensures that the delivery of alcohol treatment and harm reduction services are place-based and culturally informed.

#### Community Support and Healing Program

The Community Support and Healing Program provides culturally

	<p>appropriate SEWB services, supports and initiatives to remote communities. The program model includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Demand and harm reduction initiatives.</li> <li>• Community-wide and targeted education on SEWB services and supports.</li> <li>• Harm reduction pathways and peer support for individuals returning to community from alcohol treatment.</li> <li>• Culturally secure treatment, healing and support.</li> </ul> <p>This Schedule will also support professional development and training opportunities for the Community Support and Healing Program's workforce.</p> <p><u>Liquor Licence Compliance</u></p> <p>Liquor licence compliance activities support community safety by reducing the risk of alcohol-related harm in regional and remote areas. They ensure that alcohol is sold, supplied and consumed responsibly in accordance with the law, contributing to healthier and safer communities.</p> <p>Within the first 2-year plan for this activity, Parties will review the activities funded under this component for alignment with this Schedule's purpose, including consideration of the fiscal impact on the Parties.</p>
Governance	<p>The NTRAI Partnership Agreement sets out the enduring shared decision-making arrangements to guide NTRAI investment and maximise alignment to Closing the Gap Priority Reforms, including establishing the NTRAI Joint Steering Committee (JSC). To facilitate shared decision-making, monitoring and oversight of NTRAI investment by the JSC, the NT Government will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Prepare biennial plans to outline the strategic direction of outputs funded through this Schedule and submit these for consideration by the JSC. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Biennial plans provide a mechanism for shared decision-making and oversight of investment and reform effort, not operational arrangements for service delivery. Plans do not establish additional requirements for the purpose of assessing performance against milestones for the provision of payments to the NT Government.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>



- Prepare progress reports at 6-month intervals as per the due dates in Table 2 which will be submitted to the JSC for consideration.

The JSC will provide advice to the Commonwealth delegate on the alignment of plans and progress reports with the Partnership Agreement and Closing the Gap Priority Reforms. This advice must be provided within 10 business days of the plan being tabled. The delegate will consider the JSC's advice in determining relevant milestone payments.

If the JSC does not provide advice regarding alignment with the Partnership Agreement and the Closing the Gap Priority Reforms within 10 business days, the Commonwealth delegate will proceed with their consideration of relevant milestone payments.

The parties acknowledge payment decisions are a matter for the Commonwealth delegate in line with the *Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations*. The Commonwealth will make payments subject to performance reports demonstrating relevant milestones have been met by the NT Government.

Consistent with the NTRAI Partnership Agreement, the JSC will monitor the progress and outcomes of this Schedule to ensure this investment priority remains responsive to the evolving needs of remote NT Aboriginal communities. This may include recommending to the Ministers responsible adjustments to this Schedule over time.

In accordance with Clause 14 of the NTRAI Partnership Agreement, the parties will work collaboratively through the JSC to embed Priority Reform 4 into the monitoring and evaluation of progress and outcomes relating to outputs delivered under this Schedule.

	<p>Schedule with other place-based services.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Actively participating in the implementation of the overarching NTRAI MEAL Framework as described under the monitoring and evaluation section of this Schedule.</li> </ul> <p>APO NT is responsible for delivering ACCO sector strengthening grants, including to build organisational and financial management capacity within ACCOs. The Commonwealth will manage any funding agreement with APO NT for ACCO sector strengthening grants consistent with the terms set out in the relevant funding agreement.</p> <p><b>Reform Ambition</b></p> <p>Payments provided through this Schedule support essential service delivery to Aboriginal Territorians who live, or are from, remote Northern Territory communities. The parties agree that a principle underpinning this Schedule is ensuring the continuity of these services is maintained through certainty of funding flows and appropriate service delivery risk management.</p> <p>To support this continuity in service delivery, and in accordance with Clause 23 of the <i>Federation Funding Agreement – Affordable Housing, Community Services and Other</i>, the Northern Territory Government will report the minimum required to demonstrate milestones have been met, as set out at Table 2 and Table 3.</p> <p>Acknowledging the shared reform ambition set out in the NTRAI Partnership Agreement, the parties also commit to working towards the below aspirational targets over the six-year term of NTRAI investment for alcohol harm reduction services.</p> <p>These targets reflect the shared aspirations of the Parties to the NTRAI Partnership Agreement and are not intended to represent benchmarks for the purpose of assessing performance against milestones for the provision of payments to the Northern Territory Government under this Schedule.</p> <p>This Schedule sets two aspirational targets for Aboriginal employment:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Alcohol Harm Reduction Schedule – 30%; and</li> <li>Community Support and Healing Program – 70%.</li> </ul> <p>It also sets a target of signed agreements in place for 79 communities for the Community-Led Solutions output.<sup>1</sup></p>
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<sup>1</sup> Composition of the 79 communities will be settled in the 2-year plan process.

**Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability and Learning**

Monitoring and evaluation will occur through the NTRAI MEAL Framework as outlined in the NTRAI Partnership Agreement, and the FFA Schedule – NTRAI Evaluation.

The JSC will oversee the development of the overarching NTRAI MEAL Framework which will be underpinned by Schedule specific 2-year plans, a contemporary program logic and a data matrix to outline the intended links between the activities, outputs and outcomes supported by this Schedule and the broader outcomes and objective of the Partnership Agreement. The data matrix will outline the proposed measures, baseline data and indicators for monitoring and evaluating progress and outcomes achieved by the outputs funded through this Schedule.

Through Clause 14.3 of the NTRAI Partnership Agreement the Commonwealth and Northern Territory commit to maximising transparency in relation to broader funding commitments and allocations for remote service delivery in the Northern Territory. This requirement will be met by the parties through the NTRAI MEAL Framework.

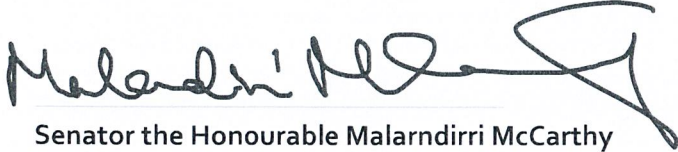

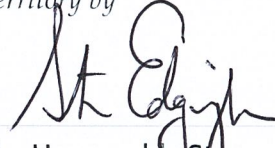
